Now, all six lights on the poles point to the track and 10 new LED lamps have been added to light the infield.

## 2019 SEASON: 70" YEAR ANNIVERSARY

**NUMANAZOO** 

The following piece of history previously appeared on the Kalamazoo Speedway website; picked up in 2003 by WinterWaterWonderland.com (the source for the photos).

Bob Kitzmiller was a former Alamo Township Supervisor and an avid race fan who followed racing in southwest Michigan. In 1949 some of the local drivers and car owners were looking for a different track to race on. Kitzmiller, who lived off Owen Drive, had a large pasture for his cattle and thought he could locate a track there. So in the summer of 1949, he moved his cattle to a new location on his farm to build a track on the pasture land.

Kitzmiller took his 1949 Mercury to the spot he picked out, put a stake in the ground and drove around in an oval to mark out the 3/8 mile that he wanted. It took him three tries to get the exact distance of 3/8 of a mile. Then he marked his tire tracks with more stakes to check the distance. The tire tracks mark the inside of the track which still stands today, as the fastest 3/8 mile in the world.

Kitzmiller knew he had a lot of work to do to get the track opened by the following year (1950) and was joined by many car owners and friends to make the opening a reality. A cement block grandstand was built along with a judge's stand and a retaining wall. Lights came later for night racing.

Sunday afternoon racing was planned for the first couple of years. It all came together and on July 20, 1950, Kitzmiller was able to open his new dream. Sixteen cars showed up and about 300 fans



welcomed the new race track (then named B & K Speedway). Ward Sootsman was the announcer and Roy Yeager was the starter.
