With practice and qualifying complete, fans streamed into the infield to chat with the drivers, snag some autographs and get a few photos.



AWARDS

Steve Needles (left) had the fastest qualifying time for the Outlaw Super Late Models (12.991seconds and 103.918 MPH). Brian Campbell (right) did the same for the ARCA'CRA Super Series with a time of 13.061 (103.361 MPH) around the 3/8 mile high-banked oval. Both drivers are pictured with the ARCA/CRA announcer Andrew Hayn, a former Kalamazoo Speedway announcer.



KALAMAZOO KLASH 'B' FFATURF

Based on qualifying times, the top 20 automatically lock into the Klash. With a high car count, that put 17 drivers into the 'B' Feature for the Klash, the first feature event of the evening. Jacob Maynard and Nick Pressler scratched. Matt Frazier was awarded the provisional to the main event for top points in the Kalamazoo Speedway Outlaw Super Late Model class of drivers who did not qualify for the top 20. That left 14 vying for the win and the \$1,000 payout sponsored by Duco Performance and fishbucklake.com. Austin Maynard (right) and Jack Landis brought the field to green for the 30-lap feature. Brian Maxim spun and brought out the first caution with 18 laps remaining. Maynard took the lead on the restart with



Landis moving to the lead with 14 to go. Chris Garrett brought out the caution with 11 laps to go when he went into the wall. Maynard led following the restart over Landis and Matt Corliss. Corliss took the second spot from Landis with 10 to go. On the final lap, Albert Francis and Kevin Sauer came together making the 30 lap feature 31. Matt Corliss and Maynard battled for the lead with Maynard taking the checkered flag. Corliss finished second followed by Jack Landis, TK Whitman and Dennis Strickland. Maynard had the option to race in the main event and forego the payout but chose to keep his trophy and the \$1,000.

ARCA/CRA SUPER SERIES 125

Harold Fair Jr. jumped out to an early and commanding lead in the 125 lap ARCA/CRA Super Series race. With 115 laps to go, it was Fair Jr., Josh Brock, Kyle Crump, Austin Kunert, Johnny VanDoorn and Carson Hocevar. VanDoorn made quick work of Kunert with Hocevar following while Fair Jr.'s lead continued to grow. With 71 to go, VanDoorn moved into second place spot as Hocevar moved into the third spot. VanDoorn took the lead at about the halfway point with Hocevar behind him to take second place. Hocevar had the lead briefly with less than 40 to go but made contact with Steve Dorer with 36 remaining; VanDoorn made the most of the opportunity and regained the lead. Hocevar gave VanDoorn a run for his money but in the end of the caution-free race it was VanDoorn, Hocevar, Josh Brock, Travis Braden and Fair Jr. Celebrating with a burnout (below) he said "to finally win it [the race] is awesome". VanDoorn has made 5 previous attempts to win this race, coming in second to Kyle Busch in 2014, 3rd in 2016 and the runner-up again last year to Travis Braden. KALAMAZOO KLASH XXVI

Some driver's days ended before the final race. Rick Senneker didn't make it out of practice discovering his new engine, in his sporty new car, had sustained more damage than realized in a multi-car pile-up during the feature on July 27. For 21 other drivers, cars were lined up on the track as each driver was introduced and went up into the grandstands to throw out an autographed hat. If that driver won Klash XXVI, the person who caught the toss won \$100. An inversion of 14 put quick time winner Steve Needles in the 14th starting position and Brandon Lyons on the pole with Monte Tolan beside to him.

Phil Bozell took the early lead from the 4th starting position and held the lead until Jeff Ganus passed him with 87 laps remaining. Todd Harrington had moved into the third position with the #25 of JR Roahrig and the #24 of Tyler Roahrig bringing up the tail of the top 5. The Roahrigs had been moving up toward the front of the pack but now they were gunning. The laps ticked off while Ganus held on to his lead. The #25 moved up behind Phil Bozell for third with the #24 remaining in the 5th position. With 50 laps to go, the senior Roahrig got the better of Bozell and set his sights on Ganus. The #24 followed his dad around Bozell with under 48 laps remaining. Although the #25 caught Ganus he couldn't get around him. Nine laps later both Roahrigs were all over Ganus. 37 laps to go proved to be a pivotal lap. JR Roahrig got around Ganus and, caution free to this point, the race had its first caution when a lapped car spun on the front stretch taking two top contenders, IR Roahrig and Jeff Ganus, out of the race. When the race resumed, Tyler Roahrig and Phil Bozell led the field to green. Roahrig took the lead and Brain Bergakker moved around Bozell into second. With 30 laps remaining, it was Roahrig, Bergakker, Bozell, Needles, Adam Terry and Lyons. With 17 to go the second and last caution of the race came out when Bozell and Needles made contact. Needles retired to the pits and Bozell retained his positon near the front of the pack. Bergakker and Roahrig led the field back to green with Bergakker getting a fast start and taking the lead for several laps before Roahrig went into the lead. Terry moved into the third spot. At the checkered it was Tyler Roahrig taking his second consecutive Klash joining only Andy Bozell and Terry Senneker Jr, in winning consecutive Klashes. Senneker Jr. holds the record for most Klash wins (5) and most consecutive (3). In his post-race interview Roahrig was pumped with the win calling it a "really kick ass race". He gave props to his competition and thanked the fans for coming out saying he loves to race at Kalamazoo because the grandstands are always full and hinted he may be back for Season Championship night.
