# CALL OF THE WILD 4" ANNUAL WORLD SERIES OF COMPACTS

It's that time of year again. The Call of the Wild "Run What Ya Brung" Night. Big boards, little boards, no boards. Wings or no wings. The Outlaw RWD cars must have a minimum 100 inch wheelbase and run on 10" tires; the Outlaw FWD must run on 8" wheels and DOT tires. Safety rules still apply but other than that, drivers can be creative. Drivers can try for the world speed record or just come out for a fun night of racing. The five fastest qualifiers move on to the RACEceiver showdown. Each of the five will get the track to themselves to attempt to break the world record for a 3/8 mile oval. We'll do that for 30 minutes or until the drivers decide they've gone as fast as their car will go and aren't making another attempt, whichever comes first. Mike Shewchuk was the first driver to go under 10 seconds in 2015 with a time of 9.924 and Andy Bozell, not all that happy to see his record fall, came back in 2016 and put an explanation point on his new record, a blistering 9.465 (breaking the record several times on his way to his final time). The RACEceiver showdown is surrounded by features, features including the 4th Annual World Series of Compacts.

## **SEASON CHAMPIONSHIP NIGHT (in review)**

What a night! We were hopping—135 cars! Drivers raced to win their last regular season feature of 2018. Point leaders and those within striking distance raced for the championship in each class. Drivers were racing for position to better themselves in the final standings or to achieve a personal best. Drivers showed up to keep their perfect attendance bonuses intact. And as we say each week, you never know what will happen and that certainly was true on Friday night Even a couple of sprinkles weren't enough to dampen the mood.

All the statistics (top 10, which drivers won features, heats, took fast-time, etc.) will be in next week's Track Talk.

Even before the racing started on Friday night there was plenty to do. Qualifying to get the starting lineups set. Over 100 backpacks were given away (with two to spare!) and fans were able to meet up with the drivers, get photographs and autographs. Those backpacks proved handy to carry the candy and other things some of the drivers were giving away. Below, two of the kids wanted a picture with the #5 of Jeff Ganus. All of the pre-race activities complete, it was time to get racing. Jack Goodrich led us off with the invocation and the National Anthem and then the sweet music of car engines and fans cheering filled the air.

Season Champion: Colin Bozell

Rookie Jerry Ballard clocked his second fast-time of the season (17.042) to start things out. Regular readers will remember that Ballard took the wheel of a Rent-a-Ride last year and this is his first season of racing, Curtis Towne came into the night up 23 points over newcomer Colin Bozell. Five laps into the 20-lap feature, Towne was in 12th place and Bozell was in 9th, each place worth 4 points. With 14 to



go it was Mason May in the lead followed by Grant Lofquist. Lofquist got around May with 13 to go and then shot out ahead of the rest of the field. With 5 remaining it was Lofquist followed by May, Rielly Meade, Cody Day and Renae Letts. Bozell was in the 6th position and Towne in the 10th. At the finish line it was Lofquist, May, Meade, Bozell and Cody Day. While Towne took the checkered flag in a position to secure the champsionship, both Towne and Ballard clocked laps under 17.00 seconds. A Zoo Stock driver cannot dip below 17.00 seconds in qualifying, a heat or a feature without being disqualified. It was especially painful for Towne that the lap that disqualified him was the white flag lap. This meant neither Towne nor Ballard (who also turned his fastest lap in lap 18) would earn points for the feature nor would Towne be the 2018 Zoo Stock Champion. Instead, Rookie Colin Bozell won his first championship with the season of a champion: 2 fast times, a feature win, and 8 top 10 finishes, 7 of those being top 5. Towne finished second in the point standings, followed by Ballard, Meade and Logan Hiemstra. Nick Failing won the B feature and Kyra Donald won the C Feature.

With Pete Doxey back in Colorado, there was no one within 150 points of Jason Essex going into tonight's race, giving him his first Kalamazoo Speedway Champsionship. Todd Metz Jr., the 2017 FWD Super Shoe Champion, was on a mission and he passed Ricky LaDuke for the lead with 14 laps to go in the 20-lap, caution-free feature. LaDuke, in a borrowed car having sold his regular ride, will be moving to the Street Stocks next year. Drew Losey ran a strong race and finished second. Paul Bittle, starting at the tail of the field along with Metz Jr., Essex and Adam VanAvery, flew through the field and moved up to third. Kyle Jansen came in fourth followed by Jason Essex rounding out the top five. John Carr, driving his brother Gabe's #15, came in 11th. Carr suffered a foot injury while dirt biking last weekend

and had to scratch for this race. Carr, 15, still earned the 8<sup>th</sup> slot in the point standings after joining the Zoo Stock class on May 18 and immediately timing out into the Outlaw FWD class. LaDuke finished 2<sup>nd</sup> in the final point standings followed by Jansen, Brock Sweeter and Doxey.

Kyle Ribble drove to his 7th fast-time of the season in qualifying. Twenty-seven Street Stocks showed up forcing a Last Chance Race. Taylor Sexton won the race and earned the right to advance along with Joe Gonzales (in his first trip to the Speedway this season), Heath Bronkema and Bob Miller. John Chapman and Al Heritz led the field to green. Heritz took a seat in the #20 car after retiring from racing 15 years ago. Heritz, a long-time Kalamazoo Speedway Race Director, just retired from that position at the end of the regular season. We'll have more on Heritz in an upcoming issue of Track Talk. Chapman led the first lap with Andy Rutherford giving challenge. With 30 to go, it was Chapman,



Rutherford, Shane Miller, Tom Rutherford and Mike Zordan. Tonight instead of tight pack racing in the middle of the pack, it was the front six going at it. Kyle Ribble wanted to show off a little more speed and shot around the leaders in a 3-wide move and then kept on going. Greg Brown, coming into the night 48 points ahead of Zack Cook, the defending champion, was in mid-field fighting to not find himself second in points for a third year running. With 10 to go Zack Cook was looking strong but Brown was keeping pace. Late in the race Ribble was in an entirely different race than the rest of the field. Ribble won the caution-free 35-lap feature followed by Tom Rutherford, Cook, Zordan and Keith Wilfong. Brown finished in the 6th spot, 34 points ahead of Cook and earned his first Season Championship. Keith Wilfong, Ribble and Shane Miller round out the top five in the final point standings.

Feature Winner: Dylan Stovall

Nineteen cars qualified and ran in the 35-lap feature. Dylan Stovall, in his first year racing at Kalamazoo Speedway and two-time track champion Jeff Vochaska led the field to the green flag. Dylan Stovall took the lead and raced to keep it. With 24 to go, Stovall had a sizeable lead over Vochaska, in his first race this season at the Speedway, holding in second place. Keegan Dykstra was driving strong in third followed by Austin Maynard, AJ Foote, Buddy Head and Kenny Head. Buddy Head's accelerator got stuck and he went hard into the outside wall and the car left the track hanging between two wreckers. Both Kenny Head and Lane Head were having issues of their own and made trips to the pits during the caution. Back to green, Dykstra was making his move to get around Vochaska for the second spot. Al Foote was in 4th and challenging for the 3rd position culminating in a red flag stop and Dykstra and Foote's cars leaving on wreckers. During the break in the racing action, Rick Beebe showed us his dance moves to Michael Jackson's Billie Jean. Who knew? Eric McGlothlen got his second wind during the stop and came charging for the leaders. What looked like it might become a race between two of the younger drivers in the Late Model Sportsman (Stovall and Dykstra) became a duel between the rookie Stovall and the more seasoned McGlothlen. The laps ticked down and Stovall managed to hold off a determined and in-your-face McGlothlen. When a late race caution came out, Stovall executed a textbook perfect restart but McGlothlen wasn't finished trying for that checkered. Coming down the front stretch on the final lap, Stovall got loose and it looked like the race was McGlothlen's, but Stovall didn't let up and got his wheels back under him crossing the finish line 0.029 seconds in front of McGlothlen in a photo finish. THAT was racing. Vochaska finished third followed by Maynard and Bill Tomlinson. On the sidelines, Buddy Head won his 6th consecutive season championship and his 7th overall. Kenny Head finished second in the final point standings followed by AJ Foote, Keegan Dykstra and Lane Head.

# OUTLAW SUPER LATE MODELS

Twenty-six drivers showed up to race in the 100-lap season finale. Chris Nash won the Last Chance Race with Tom Rutherford (who also ran in the Street Stocks), Jeff Bozell and Rob Hardy advancing to the main event. The inversion put Jeff Ganus and Rich Boal on the front row. When the green flew Ganus was off like, well, a Comet. Harrington had a slim I I point lead over Mark Shook coming into the night. Frazier went into the wall with 64 laps to go and was done for the night. When the race went back to green it was Ganus, Boal, Adam Terry, Brian Bergakker and Tyler Roahrig. Ganus was out again fast and sharp. Bergakker moved into second with 60 laps to go. Ganus continued his lead with Bergakker behind him. Roahrig passed Bergakker and had caught up with Ganus by lap 36. Another caution flew and Ganus got the better restart; Adam Terry moved into third behind Roahrig. By lap 35 Ganus had some daylight to work with. Roahrig could catch the Ganus but Ganus held him off. This duel went on for lap after lap until a caution was thrown with 8 to go. Roahrig got the better restart and the daylight now was all his. At the checkered it was Roahrig, Ganus, Bergakker, Terry and Mark Shook. Steve Dorer game in 6th with Harrington in 7th. Harrington said he struggled some this season, but his struggles paid off and he earned his first season championship at Kalamazoo Speedway. Defending champion Mark Shook came in second in the final standings followed by True, Terry and Rick Senneker.
